School Traffic

Broughton Astley - School Traffic...please don't Idle!

Idling means leaving a vehicle's engine running while it is stationary. We have had a number of complaints regarding vehicles that are idling on the roadside for quite some time, disturbing local residents.

While this is often because of everyday traffic, there are some instances, such as waiting for children outside schools when idling is not necessary and should be avoided.

Idling increases the amount of exhaust fumes in the air. T

Rule 123 of The Highway Code looks at 'The Driver and the Environment'. It states that drivers must not leave a parked vehicle unattended with the engine running or leave a vehicle engine running unnecessarily while the vehicle is stationary on a public road.

Local authorities have the power to issue £20 fixed penalties for engine idling if a motorist refuses to switch off their engine, regardless of the location under The Road Traffic Regulations 2002. There's potential for the fine to increase to £80.

Research suggests that 26% of those caught idling are spotted doing so outside schools.
